Fmaily formals without proper preparation can be a hectic and crazy part of the day... Missing family members, no organization, & people trying to figure out the next set of people... It can be a mad house and will reflect on you as a photographer. We like our family formals to be very organized so we've put together a list of tips to help make them quick and painless. Having an organized and seamless approach to family forals makes for happy clients, family members and referrals.



Pro Tip:

1. Send out your family formals questionaire three months prior to the wedding. You are close enough to the date for the groupings to be pretty much set but before all the other vendors are sending out final prep emails. The final 30 days prior to the wedding is a very overwhelming time and you don't want to add to that stress.





Tips & Tricks





BE COMMUNICATIVE

Have your client communicate with thier family members about family formals BEFORE the wedding day! They should send a dedicated email explaing that family members should not go to cockatil hour and to report to the photo locaion immediatly follwoing the ceremoy. This will keep you from having to hunt people down during portratis.





IMMEDIATE FAMILY ONLY

If the couple doesn't do a first look, Our family formals are immediate family only. (Parents, Siblings, Grandparents) It keeps things moving quickly and allows for the most time to get those romantic bride and groom portraits. We will have plenty of time at the reception if they would like to get some large photos with Aunts or Cousins.





HAVE A "WRANGLER"

Have your client assign a wrangler. The bride & groom shouldn't be running around trying to find missing family members. This will cut into precious photo time and adds stress. In theory, this person should know both sides of the family quite well and not be an immediate family member.

This is usually a great job for an usher or bridal party member.








WAIT FOR CANDIDS



Posing Tips





MAKE A STRAIGHT LINE

Keep Everyone on the same focal plane by having them form a straight line. People will naturally make a "U" shape.

I tell everyone to line up their toes and then I turn them in towards the bride and groom.





BUILD CONNECTIONS

Building connections between the family members makes the photo more personal and relaxed. I have the groom help hold the flowers of the bride. If they are akward heights, I will have him put his hand in his pocket. Bridesmaids should hold their flowers, mothers touch the arm of the bride or groom. and men on the ends either put their hand in their pocket or touching their spouse.





PARENT SHOT

I have the parents angle in towards each other with their inside arm around the waist. The man should put his hand in his pocket and I have the woman put her hand on his chest or relaxed down at her side.
